UNIVERSITY OF TORONTO ARCHIVES AND RECORDS MANAGEMENT SERVICES

MISSION

University of Toronto Archives and Records Management Services (UTARMS) is dedicated to acquiring, preserving and making available the documentary heritage of the University of Toronto as a permanent resource in support of operational, educational, and research needs of the University community and the general public. While promoting the fullest access to information we are bound to protect the privacy of individuals and corporate bodies entrusting their records to our care and to maintain the highest possible standards of professionalism and archival practice.

MANDATE

University of Toronto Archives and Records Management Services is responsible for the appraisal, acquisition, preservation and use of University records of permanent value and the private records of individuals and organisations associated with the University. UTARMS works co-operatively with other permanent campus archives programmes devoted to preserving their sponsor's documentary heritage. As well as providing a research service, the department provides an administrative service through the development and implementation of the University's records management programme. The objectives of this programme are detailed in the Terms of Reference of the Presidential Advisory Committee on Archives and Records Management.

1. INTRODUCTION

Over the past year, many of our accomplishments have been related directly to the impact of provincial legislation on access and privacy. Indeed the impact of this legislation has resulted in a realignment of our 5-year plan to focus more on accountability rather than research. The first quarter of the year found staff heavily involved in implementation of our strategies to comply with the *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act (FIPPA)*. Preparations for the enactment of this legislation on June 10, 2006 had been well underway in the preceding months. By mid June, staff had implemented new procedures for administering researcher requests to restricted university records accessions including the updating of online database records, the distribution of new Informal Access Review request forms and a notice of collection of personal information for registration purposes. In addition, staff completed the severing of unpublished personal information from more than 50,000 biographical files in A1973-0026 (See Section 7.3). This work allowed a heavily used historical resource to be issued to researchers without any breaches of privacy.

In spite of this new challenge, staff still maintained a consistent level of service to researchers and donors. Collection growth continued with the department accepting 44% more acquisitions than in the previous year including gifts-in-kind valued at more than \$200,000. Training of more than 150 university administrators in best practices for records management continued throughout the year. These seminars have become increasingly important to administrators with the enactment of *FIPPA*.


A highlight of the year was the completion of a revamped web site. Using the Library's new content management system, Archives staff revised the site and presented it in a new up to date look. New pages were added relating to Donor relations, as well as an enhanced description of holdings supported by a new *fonds* level listing. An online exhibit relating to the history the University's Charter as well as a gallery of images also enhanced the content of our web site.

2. ACQUISITIONS

2.1 Collection Growth¹

The department continued to acquire substantial volumes of both university and private records. Eighty-one metres (266 feet) or university records and 50 metres (164 feet) of private records (gifts-in-kind) were received during the year. In addition 2.86 metres of serials and .14 metres of monographs were received and catalogued. We did not receive any theses during the year, reflecting our long standing practice of no longer acquiring these materials. Thus a total of 131 metres (430 feet) of archival materials, plus 3.0 metres of library materials were acquired. The grand total of 134 metres is an increase of 44% over 2005-2006 volume of 93 metres. Our overall collection growth volume now stands at 8,825 metres (28,953 feet).

While the majority of the new acquisitions in the past year are textual, a significant increase of special media was also noted. During the year more than 15,000 prints and slides received in 2005-2006 were described and added to our holdings. Other special media included works of art, and some sound and moving image records.



2.2 University Records (A Accessions)

During the year, 81 metres were received from university offices – an increase of just 8 metres over 2005-2006. Major acquisitions included four accession accruals to the fonds of Office of the President (21 metres), and Office the Vice-president, Business Affairs (49 metres). The remaining 8 accessions consisted of transfers of some special media as well as new acquisition of records from the Health Science Information Consortium of Toronto.

2.3 Private Records (B Accessions)

A total of 27 accessions were received from private sources for a total of approximately 50 metres of material. The majority of these were gifts-in-kind received directly from retired faculty or from their estates. These acquisitions were an increase of 72% over 2005-2006 (29 metres)

New fonds received included papers of Melvyn Fuss (economics), Howard Chapman (architecture), Barry French (aerospace), and John Evans (medicine and former President). Accruals to existing fonds included Gordon Slemon, James E. Guilllet, Thomas P Morley, R.G. Riddell, Michael Bliss, H.S.M Coxeter, and C.P.Stacey, among others.

Many of these were processed as gifts for the 2006 tax year. See Section 4.1.2 for details.

2.4 Special Media Records (Table 1)

Of the accessions received, the following are important additions to our collections and include, among others, over 55 glass lantern slides (B2006-0031) dating from the 1920's and created to illustrate helium experiments articles undertaken by J. Wilhelm as a student working with Prof. J. C. McLennan. Also received were sketch books of Anne McJanet (B2007-0001). These were created by her while she was an undergraduate architecture student in the mid 1950s. Four water colours by Toronto artist Anthony Batten provided contemporary documentation of St. George campus scenes and adjacent buildings on Huron Street. Another work of art included a framed charcoal portrait of Dr. John Price Brown (MB 1868, MD 1869) drawn by his son, Newton Harcourt Brown (PhmB 1895). Photographs of University of Toronto graduating classes, sports and ceremonies were received from both university offices and private donors.

2.5 Donations for Monetary Evaluation (Gifts-in-kind)

In 2006 tax year, staff received and processed 18 donations of private papers valued at \$200,450. As in previous years the majority of these gifts were received from current or former faculty, or their families. We are grateful to all our donors for their contributions to preserving the history of the University through their gifts of their own or their relative's personal papers.

3. RECORDS MANAGEMENT

3.1 Training Session

Between May 2006 and April 2007, Loryl MacDonald, Records Archivist, presented six seminars to 90 employees attending the Records Management series three core courses. Participants represent 8 administrative units and 4 academic offices. Loryl also provided four special presentations to staff: Techknowfile with Garron Wells on May 17 (20 attendees), the Business Officers Training Program on November 10 (13 people), University of Toronto Mississauga on November 22 (19 people), and the Directors of VP-Research Services with Garron Wells (14 people). In all, a total of 156 staff received training on various records management topics.

3.2. Consultation, inquiries, and other activities

During the past year, 88 inquiries were received relating to records management. Loryl made 33 site visits. Among the offices receiving this service were the Ethics Review Office, Governing Council, the Faculty of Information Studies' Registrars Office, the Pierre Trudeau Institute for Peace, the Office of the President, Procurement Services, St. Michael's College Registrar's Office, and the Office of the Vice-President Business Affairs.

3.3 Provincial access and privacy legislation

3.3.1 Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act

On June 10, 2006, amendments to this Act came into force making all universities in Ontario subject to its provisions. Since 2005, annual reports of this department have detailed discussions, negotiations, strategies and plans undertaken by the Ontario university community and the University of Toronto. In last year's report, Section 7.1 described the processes to be undertaken by this department to comply with the Act which covered virtually all university records held in the Archives and some private records as well. Loryl MacDonald incorporated the implications of this legislation on University record keeping practices during training sessions.

Specific training on how to administer the legislation within university offices is under the jurisdiction of the University's Director, Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy. More details on the impact of this legislation on our operations are described in Section 5 Reference and Section 7 Administration.

Shortly before the implementation of this legislation, Garron Wells and Loryl MacDonald met with Graham Kemp, Manager, Administrative Management Systems to develop a pilot project for a University "Directory of Personal Information Banks" in compliance with reporting requirements under FIPPA. Following several meetings, Garron Wells designed a database in DBTextWorks and entered 46 sample records based on existing records retention schedules. This DBTextWorks database was made available on-line with the assistance of Marc Lalonde in the Library's ITS office. This project was suspended in June when the University postponed a decision to publish such a directory pending further direction from the provincial government.

4. ARRANGEMENT AND DESCRIPTION

4.1 University (A Accessions) and Private Records (B Accessions) (Table 2)

4.1.1 University (A Accessions)

As more offices review their record keeping practices, in part as a result of the implications of FIPPA, the need to determine the final disposition of inactive files has become more pressing. Our procedures require that offices provide a list of all records they wish to transfer to the Archives. For some offices, this can be an onerous task given limited resources and often very short timelines for completion. In some cases offices work with the Archives staff to develop a cooperative project to list, pack and dispose of inactive records. Such a project was conducted with the Office of V.P. Business Affairs. Funds from this office paid for the services of a contract archivist who worked under the supervision of Loryl MacDonald, Records Archivist. The contractor boxed and compiled a file list in standard format to simplify the process of appraisal and selection, since these records were not subject to any pre-approved retention schedule. As a result, the Office of V.P. Business Affairs was able to transfer to the Archives some 49 metres of records, resulting in the freeing up of valuable office space within a relatively short time period. Such projects are very productive and we will continue to encourage university offices to undertake such projects in cooperation with the Archives.

During the year, Lagring Ulanday reviewed accessions containing examinations to determine whether they could be open to research because they were only the questions and therefore not subject to *FIPPA*. This affected 59 accessions for 16 fonds.

Finding aids were also revised or produced depending on the current state of these research tools. Motivation for revisions or production of finding aids this year resulted from review of records subject to FIPPA. For example, the finding aid for A1967-0007, Office of the President records (Robert Falconer) was repeatedly revised as files were reviewed and their access status determined. This finding aid has been expanded now to describe many boxes at the file level, resulting in 50% more pages. In addition to these finding aids, an additional 336 pages of file level finding aids (for approximately 20 accessions) were produced. Garron Wells and Loryl MacDonald, with the assistance of ALTS and contract staff were largely responsible for this work.

4.1.2 B Accessions (Private Records)

Harold Averill and Marnee Gamble undertook the arrangement and description of 10 gifts-in-kind eligible for 2006 tax receipts and for one remaining from the 2005 tax year. They included papers of Dr. James Till, (medicine), Margaret Allemang, (Nursing) Edward Barbeau, (economics) Rudi Christl (photographer), H.S.M. Coxeter (mathematics), Barry French (aerospace), Melvyn Fuss (economics), James Guillet (chemistry) W.Harding le Riche, (hygiene) Thomas P. Morley (medicine) and Robert G. Riddell.(history). As a result a total

of 213 additional pages of description were produced and the relating finding aids made available on line through our web site.

4.2 Special Media

4.2.1 Image Bank Database – Web version

Another 78 images were described and added to the on-line Image Bank. The total now stands at about 1350 images.

4.2.2 Graphic Records

All 2006 accessions containing graphic images were described in the in-house Graphics Database. In total 17 descriptions were added. In other work, over 10,000 negatives and over 3,000 slides received in accession A2005-0019 (Records of the Faculty of Physical Education and Health) were described by Marnee Gamble.³ This finding aid is still in progress but is expected to be available by mid 2007-2008.

4.2.3 Sound and Moving Images Database

Plans to add B2005-0025 (Edgar Vaar film relating to Canadian and U. of T. track and field events) description to the Sound and Moving Images database was deferred to 2007-2008.

4.2.4 Architectural records: New Guide to Architectural Records

Garron Wells began work on an item level finding aid to B1995-0055, records of Mathers & Haldenby, Architects consisting of approximately 500 drawings. Up until this time the collection has been stored with Property Design and Construction at 250 Huron Street and was used as working drawings for many major buildings on the campus. A database in DBTextWorks was designed to accommodate both this collection as well as the data of the former *Guide to architectural records* produced in 1988, and any other accessions of architectural drawings. During this reporting period approximately 30% of the drawings in B1995-0055 were described. When this work is completed the database will be made accessible to the public.

4.3 Theses and Print Room materials

4.3.1 Graduate Theses – online records

Barbara Edwards continued to update SIRSI workflows with data from the University Archives card catalogue of M.A. theses. An additional 151 records were created in UT Library's online catalogue (UTCAT). Subsequently, records totalling 1296 University of Toronto M.A. theses from 1890 to 1966 which are held in the Archives are now available to the U of T community and the general public.

Barbara continues to represent the Archives as a member on the Library's Theses Committee.

4.3.2 Monographs

Barbara processed 93 books (M-accessions) of which 82 data entries were described in SIRSI workflows. These consist of items with LC call numbers and pamphlets with unique call numbers. The pamphlet collection has acquired an additional .64 metres contributing to overall 216 monographs entered in UTCAT for this period.

4.3.3 Periodicals

Records for new and current periodicals (P-accessions) continue to be created and updated in the Archives' inhouse Serials database and then stored in the Print Room. For this reporting period, work on current newspapers and other serials were done by Assistant Library Technicians Lauren Bride-Stillie and Meredith White. During May to August, Lauren filed and entered data relating to 13 issues of newspapers. From September 2006 to April 2007, 116 newspaper issues and 82 other serials were added by Meredith White. Meredith also entered data for existing issues classified as 'P' accessions to records for current newspapers such as *The Varsity*, *The Independent* and others. This work now allows faster access to original materials filed in our print room. Similarly, previous years' periodicals (backlog P-accessions) were processed by Barbara Edwards and 13.22 metres described. The acquisition of many of these backlog periodicals and monographs has helped to fill gaps in the Print Room's holdings.

5. REFERENCE SERVICES

5.1 Reference and Research Services (Table 3 and Figures 1-3)

Reference and research volumes changed very little over last year as indicated in the table below. While reading room use of accessions showed a decline to 1,671 (from 2117 in 2005-06), daily users volume remained stable. Since declines are evident in both the use of university records and private records, it seems that the application of *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act* as of June 2006 has not really deterred research. (See 5.2 below for details). Furthermore written (mainly email) inquiries as well as phone enquires remain at or above levels experienced in 2005-2006, prior to the implementation of the legislation.

In 2007 two faculties, Education and Forestry, celebrate their centennials. The Archives assisted both in preparing for their celebrations: in particular, Mark Kulhberg in his writing of the history of the Faculty of Forestry and for OISE/UT's 'Centennial Archives Project' and DVD, 'Celebrating 100 Years of Education at the University of Toronto'. In 2006, Professor Craig Brown began research for his history of the Faculty of Arts and Science.

5.2 Informal Access Reviews and Research Agreements

As reported last year, the Archives implemented two strategies to facilitate research access to university records subject to review under *FIPPA*. Garron Wells and Loryl MacDonald were responsible for carrying out much of the work related to these two strategies. The following statistics are for period June 12, 2006 to April 30, 2007.

Informal Access Reviews

Informal access reviews involve the reading of all documents in files subject to review under FIPPA. A detailed process is in place whereby

researchers provide list of records (Accession no., box no. and/ or file no) on the Informal Access
 Review Request form

- Archives staff reviews each page for any sensitive personal information.
- The record, file or box is determined to be either Open, or Restricted in part or Restricted in whole
- Archives staff segregate if possible any sensitive records from a file or box, filing these in another box designated as 'restricted'
- Archives staff revises the finding aid, if one exists.

Most researchers opted for this approach.

Research agreements

Research agreements may be issued to researchers under Regulation 460 (10) (1). To protect personal privacy researchers must agree not to use any information on an identifiable individual without the express written permission of the University Archives. The process involves a personal interview, the compilation of a list of relevant accessions by the researcher, and the preparation of a research agreement document with a specified time limit to conduct the research.

5.3 Web site developments

5.3.1 Redesign of web site

The University Library rolled out a new Content Management System (CMS) for the production of web pages on departmental web sites. University Archives staff attended training sessions and then developed a plan to redesign the look and layout of information on our web site. The old content of the web site was reviewed and a new presentation developed. Some pages were updated and/or edited with a view to improving the presentation of information to three broad groups of users: researchers, university administrators and donors. Pages relating to records management remained relatively unchanged, while those dealing with research were simplified. New pages relating to donations of both monetary and gifts-in-kind were added. A new homepage reflecting the CMS design and new graphics were produced with the assistance of Information Technology Services department and published in March.

Another addition to the web site was an online exhibit detailing "The Story of the University of Toronto's Charter". Written by Harold Averill and illustrated with pages of the original 1827 Charter and other historical images, viewers learn of this important document's place in our University's history. Viewers can also examine closely each page of the Charter and the official seal. We look forward to developing similar exhibits highlighting significant archival records relating to the University's long history.

5.3.2 Fonds level descriptions

In January, new pages listing university records fonds and private records fonds were developed. In March, two alphabetical listings were published, along with sample fonds level pages. Only a small percentage of full fonds level pages with corresponding links to finding aids (in PDF) and/or Accessions database records have been produced to date. This is a long term project and new pages will be added as time permits. For the time being work is being undertaken primarily by Garron Wells with assistance from Lagring Ulanday.

5.4 Old Messengers, New Media: the Legacy of Innis and McLuhan

During the 2006-2007 year, the University Archives worked in partnership with Library and Archives Canada (LAC) to provide content for their new web site entitled *Old Messengers, New Media: the Legacy of Innis and McLuhan*. The site is http://www.collectionscanada.ca/innis-mcluhan/index-e.html

The following is an extract from the Introduction to the website:

"Welcome to Old Messengers, New Media. The main goal of this website is to introduce and discuss the ideas of two great Canadian thinkers in the field of communications -- Harold Innis and Marshall McLuhan -- both of whom had an enormous influence on the foundation and direction of the study of modern communications.....As with its other websites, LAC has endeavoured to illustrate the current theme with photographs, manuscripts, and audiovisual materials from its own collections, as well as from the University of Toronto, which holds a rich collection on Harold Innis, including his private papers. Given that both of the thinkers featured in Old Messengers, New Media were concerned with media's role in, and effects on, society and knowledge, it is interesting to consider what McLuhan and Innis would have thought about their ideas being presented through such a variety of media, including the World Wide Web."

This online exhibit documents the writings and contributions of two major twentieth century scholars, both of whom were University of Toronto faculty members: Prof. Harold A. Innis (1894-1952) and Prof. Marshall McLuhan (1911-1980). Marnee Gamble, Special Media Archivist, facilitated the digitization of nearly 100 items from accessions in the Harold Adams Innis Fonds including photographs, textual items and sound recordings, as well as items relating to Marshall McLuhan, professor of communications at the University of Toronto (1946-1979), contained in the Robert Lansdale Photography fonds. Of those provided to LAC, about 25% were published in the online exhibit, which was launched in March 2007. ⁴ The web site also includes original essays by experts on Innis and McLuhan. Two authors in particular, Prof. William Buxton (Concordia University) and Prof. Michael Cheney (University of Illinois) used resources in the University Archives extensively.

Marnee Gamble also began consultation with the Faculty of Physical Education and Health for a proposed exhibit on Track and Field history at Varsity Stadium to be completed for July 2007. With the help of Dean Bruce Kidd, preliminary processing and description was completed for the Edgar Vaar film (B2005-0025),

UNIVERSITY ARCHIVES ACCESSIONS USE



UNIVERSITY ARCHIVES MONTHLY USERS




6. FACILITIES

6.1 Storage

Our use of commercial off-site storage space continued to grow as a major storage space for university records accessions. Discussions continued with Library staff regarding to use of University of Toronto Libraries at Downsview (UTLD) for the storage of holdings, but no final decisions were made. The volume of materials held off site grew by 51 metres (167 feet) to a total of 1590 metres (5,216 feet).

7. ADMINISTRATION

7.1 Compliance with Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act (FIPPA)

As reported last year, the Archives had developed a plan to bring the operations of the department in line with this new legislation. By the summer, new policies and procedures had been issued to all staff detailing new approaches to reference services, reading room registration, and accessions use. Researchers were advised both verbally and in writing about the legislation and the resulting delays in accessing restricted university records accessions. An information sheet on the Informal Access Review process was provided to readers and to those inquiring by phone and mail. Garron Wells and Loryl MacDonald met with readers as necessary to discuss the informal access review (IAR) option or the use of Research Agreements. An IAR database was developed by Loryl MacDonald to record each record, file or box reviewed and statement on access.

7.2 Staffing

No changes to full time staffing occurred during this period. Assistant Library Technicians during this period were Lauren Stillie, Ruth Namisato, and Meredith White.

7.3 Closing, August 2006

A major project conducted during this annual two week closing period was the review of 50,000 files in A1973-0026. This project was undertaken as part of our strategy to comply with the provisions of FIPPA. This accession consists of biographical files arranged in alphabetical order and containing both published and unpublished materials on an identifiable individual. Each staff member was assigned approximately 10,000 files to review for sensitive personal information, to pull the relevant documents and file them separately according to predetermined procedures. When appropriate, original photographs were also segregated from the files. During the two week period, staff completed the review of 40,000 files and the remainder was completed by mid October. Meredith White completed the boxing and shelving of these files in the fall. As a result this high use series of records was made accessible without delay to researchers for the new academic year.

7.4 Professional and Other Activities

Marnee Gamble and Barb Edwards attended an Introduction to Photoshop course.

Loryl MacDonald conducted a class on legal issues in records management and archives for Professor Barbara Craig's Faculty of Information Studies graduate class, 1330 Archives Concepts and Issues.

Loryl also continued to serve on the Association of Canadian Archivists' (ACA) Board as Director without Portfolio. She also served as Chair of the ACA Review and Renewal Committee. In addition, Loryl presented a paper entitled, Enter at Your Risk: Electronic Records as Admissible Evidence and taught a one day ACA workshop on

legal issues at the ACA Annual Conference in St. John's Newfoundland in June. Further, she also taught a two day workshop, Law and Original Order, for the Association of Manitoba Archives in February and gave a lecture on archives and legal issues for George Brown College archival students in April. Loryl also discussed a career in archives with Patricia Singleton, Robert Caldwell, and Sean Smith. In February, she talked about archival associations for 18 George Brown College archives students at the U. of T Archives. Harold Averill continued with his volunteer work at the Canadian Lesbian and Gay Archives serving as a member of the operations committee and the facilities committee. Lagring Ulanday continued in her position as Chapter Archivist with the Toronto Chapter of ARMA, attending meetings of the Board and advising on the preservation and use of the Chapter's archival records including the negotiation of arrangements with the City of Toronto Archives as the permanent repository.

Garron Wells presented a paper entitled "Private Archives – can we afford them anymore?" at the Annual Conference of the Association of Canadian Archivists in St. John's Newfoundland in June. She continued as a member of the Steering Committee of the ICA/SUV (International Council on Archives/Section on Universities and Research Institutions archives). During the year she chaired the Nominations Committee and reported the results of elections at the annual meeting in Reykjavik, Iceland in September.

Garron also supervised a student undertaking an arrangement and description project of the C. P. Stacey fonds for the Faculty of Information Studies course FIS1331 (Prof. Wendy Duff).
